Helping People Get Diagnosed

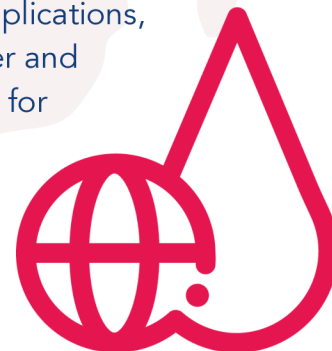
Helping close the diagnostic gap and connect more people to care. Despite progress, more than two-thirds of people with hemophilia worldwide remain undiagnosed. WFH continues to strengthen diagnosis efforts so that more people can receive the care and support they need earlier in life.

Delivering Access to Treatment

WFH exceeded its five-year goal of reaching 30,000 people through the Humanitarian Aid Program, helping people gain access to life-saving treatment and care that can reduce pain, prevent disability, and improve quality of life.

Early Treatment Changes Lives

Preventive treatment helps reduce bleeding episodes and long-term complications, supporting healthier and more active futures for children living with hemophilia.

Strengthening Healthcare Systems Through Data

Through the World Bleeding Disorders Registry (WBDR), treatment centres are collecting and using data to improve patient outcomes, support research, guide health policies, and strengthen care delivery.
